Easter is upon us, and Christians all over the world will celebrate Jesus' resurrection from the dead and the fulfillment of God's promise for eternal life. But, do we really think about the meaning and why we celebrate this season?

Most Americans delight in the Easter bunny, games and egg hunting on Easter day. For many, it's their one day of attending services at churches. But, without Jesus' journey to the cross, Easter doesn't really exist.

The Bible gives us the reason why Jesus came to us: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (John 3:16).

Jesus' true motivation was to fulfill God's love for the world and to offer eternal life to humankind. And God's manifestation of extreme love was to offer his Son as the sacrifice for the world. Jesus' birth was an indication that his journey would be arduous and demanding. Indeed, Jesus' life during his time of ministry was not considered to be a journey of comfort and pleasure: especially, his final journey to Jerusalem. Although even his followers didn't understand the true purpose of his final journey, Jesus was certain of his mission.

In fact, his followers and a great crowd welcomed Jesus as the next Messiah, the superhero for their people. They greeted him with shouts of 'Hosanna!' which was equal to 'Praise God and his Messiah, we are saved!' But the journey didn't end as they hoped. Jesus, their expected Messiah, was helplessly arrested by the Roman authority, beaten, and crucified on the cross, the most humiliating and torturous means of capital punishment.

Why did Jesus make the journey to Jerusalem? His journey was completely and truly about his mission stated in John 3:16. His journey was to fulfill God's love for the world and to offer humankind a chance for a new life. On the cross, he completed his journey, and on the third day, he showed the world there is the new life of eternal peace and blessing.


Therefore, the journey to the cross and thus to the Easter morning is not about the rituals, festivities, or programs, but a reflection of our own life seeking to overcome the bondage of greed and selfishness that leads to sin and death in our world.

On this holy week and Easter, let us meditate on the heart of Jesus as he journeyed to Jerusalem. Jesus made the way; He paid the price for our eternal life. "Jesus paid it all; all to Him I owe."

Operation Christmas Child—2022 Statistics

Samaritan's Purse began sending shoeboxes for Christmas via Operation Christmas Child in 1993. This year marks the 30th year for this ministry. A record of 200,000,000+ shoeboxes were collected as of the 2022 project. The 200 millionth shoebox was delivered to an 8-year-old orphan girl in the Ukraine



The United States and 7-8 other countries participate in Operation Christmas Child. The worldwide total of shoeboxes received during 2022 is 10,599,907. Included in this total is 9,303,130 shoeboxes collected in the United States. The US total also includes a total of 342,000 shoeboxes that were ordered online using the "build a box" option.

Our church prepared 56 shoeboxes in 2022. That number may seem small compared to the numbers above, but our support helped Operation Christmas Child reach a large number of children for the 2022 project. We appreciate everyone who took time to prepare these shoeboxes.

More news will be shared in the fall for the 2023 project. The official date for the 2023 collection week for dropping off completed shoeboxes is November 13-20.
